Buddy Poppy Report for Spring 2005 Conference

Our total as of April 1st was 470,000, which although more than 60% of goal is only 500 poppies above 2004 Spring Conference totals.

The goal for this year was lowered in order to provide a better opportunity to reach goal of 700,000. Unfortunately, the numbers between Spring Conferences remain relatively similar. Memorial Day is just six weeks away. If every Post purchased just five hundred Buddy Poppies we would easily surpass goal. We appreciate the work thus far, but a lot of work remains before the Department Convention in June.

Department of New York VFW maintains exclusive distribution authorization. Current cost of

Buddy Poppies is \$130.00 per 1,000. If your Post has not ordered Buddy Poppies to date, now is the time to order for delivery before Memorial Day.

Welfare Fund receives all proceeds accumulated from Buddy Poppy receipts. With proper Buddy Poppy distribution planning, your Post Welfare Fund will become self sufficient while helping members who are temporarily in need of assistance.

Remember Buddy Poppies are constructed by disabled veterans in hospitals throughout New York State. Post Buddy Poppy purchases assist your Post Welfare Fund while helping disabled veterans in veteran hospitals become a little selfsufficient. Buddy Poppies help the distributor and producer. Every Post should include an annual budget item to purchase Buddy Poppies. This usually produces substantial increase to Post Welfare Fund.

Buddy Poppy orders will be delivered by Memorial Day. With your help, the goal of 700,000 could be achieved. Place your orders now.

All Post Quartermasters,

By now you should have received an election report from National. Section 217 of the Manual of Procedure states that Posts will hold elections during April. IT is important that you submit an election report as soon as possible after elections. The Election report is used by National, Department, District and County Council to prepare mailing lists.

Please remember that National will not send you a quartermaster's kit unless they have a properly completed election report on file. In addition, National will not list the quartermasters' name on the dues notices without an election report. Failure to submit a properly completed election report will result in our post's charter being cancelled by National.

The election report you received from National is a two part form, the original goes to National and the copy remains in the post. Please make a copy of the election report and send it here to Department Headquarters. It is important that we have a copy early so that we can prepare our mailing lists and state director. In addition, if National misplaces your report, we will have a copy to send them when we receive the listing of missing reports.

If you did not receive an election report, you can print a copy from the Department website at www.vfwny.com. If you don't have internet access, call the office and we will mail you a form.

Removal of Post Quartermaster of Post

The following will constitute the Department Judge Advocate's opinion with respect to declaring vacant the office of Post Quartermaster of Post for his alleged failure to properly carry out the duties of his office.

An inspection of the Post, by the County Council Commander as set forth in his correspondence to you, lists a litany of various and sundry alleged acts of nonfeasance, misfeasance and malfeasance of the Quartermaster of Post, none of which appear to be of a grave nature.

The County Council Commander has recommended that the Post Quartermaster of Post be relieved of his duties and the office declared vacant, and relies on Section 220, the third paragraph thereunder for his authority to take such drastic action.

The pertinent language of Section 220 of the National By-Laws and Manual of Procedure provides for declaring vacant the position of any elective officer is as follows:

"A Post, at a regular meeting, if notice of intent to do so has been given at a prior regular meeting, may be two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present declare vacant the position of any elective officer ... who has failed to fulfill the duties of office specified in Section 218 of the By-Laws and Manual of Procedure. No Post member may bring a motion before any Post meeting to vacate any elective Post office unless written notice of the proposed action has been given to the officer holding such office, the Post Adjutant and the Department Commander at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall be mailed to such officer by certified or registered mail addressed to such officer's last known address and shall clearly state the reasons for the proposed action. The Post Adjutant shall give notice to the Post membership prior to the meeting that the matter of declaring the vacancy will be taken up. AT the meeting, the officer shall be advised of the facts underlying the proposed action and afforded an opportunity to present evidence in his own behalf."

Our National By-Laws and Manual of Procedure have no provision authorizing a County Council Commander to direct a Post Commander to declare vacant any elective Post office. This is best left to the Post

VA Budget Heading in Wrong Direction

WASHINGTON (May 5, 2005) – By a narrow vote in the House (214-211) and Senate (52-47), Congress passed a budget proposal last week that recommended a \$990 million increase to next year's Department of Veterans Affairs health care system.

"This is a budget that's headed in the wrong direction," said the commander-in-chief of the Veterans of Foreign wars of the U.S., who's worried that Congress' recommendation could give appropriators a blueprint to focus more on reducing the federal deficit than helping disabled military veterans.

"There are costs to war that continue long after the last shots are fired," said John Furgess. "This proposal will have virtually no impact in the VA health care being provided to those returning from the battlefields of Iraq and Afghanistan, where modern medical care and body-armor advances are saving more lives, but often at the cost of limbs and other traumatic injuries."

The VA estimates it needs annual increases of 12 to 14 percent just to keep pace with inflation and other uncontrollable expenses. The \$990 million recommendation passed in the House and Senate is only an

Membership, or pursuant to the following paragraph of Section 220:

"The Department Commander may, with respect to any Post, within the Department, and with the concurrence of the District Commander, declare vacant the position of any Post officer who fails to fulfill the duties of his office as required by section 218. Such action, and reasons therefore, shall be reduced to writing, in the form of a Special Order, and delivered personally or by certified United States mail at the removed officer's last known address."

Another alternative would be to use the procedure set forth in Article IX – Discipline, of the National By-Law and Manual of procedure

Furgess acknowledged that money isn't the only solution to the VA's problems, but the lack of proper funding creates far more problems throughout the entire system. That's why the VFW has volunteered its services to help Congress and the VA to create a plan for the out-years, a roadmap addresses funding, accountability, oversight, collections, benefits, infrastructure, personnel, and equipment acquisitions and upgrades.

"The VA operates the largest integrated health care system in the country," said Furgess. "And similar to other service industries, it must have a plan for the future that focuses on the lifelong health care needs of a new generation of veterans without compromising the care being provided to previous generations," he said.

"This new generation of American soldiers has the support of America. What these soldiers need is for their government to care for their minds and bodies if broken or for their families should they die," he explained. "What they might get, however, is a VA budget that fails to address their needs, one that defers VA's problems to the next Congress."

The VFW commander is now asking all veterans to contact their elected officials and urge them to increase VA funding before it is too late. The budget recommendation is now in the House and Senate Appropriations Committees to provide actual dollars.

"On behalf of our nation's 25 million veterans and those serving in uniform today, I urge this Congress to remember that the phrase, 'From a grateful nation,' means more than just a few words spoken at military funerals."
