



Each year we face new challenges in our membership program. At the end of 1996, the Department of New York had a total of 105,960 members. The current membership as of June 30, 2007, is 78,663. Currently we are down 4,082 members for the year. This equates to approximately \$46,000 in lost revenue for 2006-07. Since 1996 our membership has declined by 27,297 members, which in one

The 2006-2007 membership year has found us approximately 5,000 members down from the previous year. This is a crushing blow for all of us. Because of the drop in membership last year and the continuing decline in previous years, we are on the verge of having some of our major programs collapse. And we are also close to losing our seat on the National Council of Administration. We have already cancelled the Officer Training for this year. The Council of Administration has also tried to make other cuts that are not popular for our officers and membership. Everyone has some ideas on how we might be able to carry on as normal. But the only real answer lies in Membership.

The drop in membership this year alone will equate to a loss of thousands of dollars. We, as elected officers, appointed officers, and members of the largest combat organization in the world, must stand up to the plate and become recruiters for our great organization. Not for our personal accolades but for the returning Veterans. We need to represent these individuals on our local levels, state levels, and in the Congress of the United States. Without the membership numbers, they won't act on our Veterans' needs. They will listen to us; but without the numbers, others

with more of a voting strength will get the dollars.

This year the incoming State Commander has asked that we reach out to not only the War on Terror Veterans but also to the Women Veterans. He has appointed four women to help in this endeavor. These individuals and their areas of responsibility are posted in the newly designed Membership Book. Also in this book is a month-by-month description of how to make a hundred percent in membership for all concerned. Please follow these guidelines, and you, as an officer, will reap the benefits and so will the Veterans of the Great State of New York and the United States of America.

As your appointed membership Chairman for the ensuing year, I look forward to seeing you in my travels this year. As you go about your daily activities, please think about our Veterans' needs and sign up those eligible Veterans. Remember our motto to Honor the Dead by Helping the Living.

For the first time in the 21st century, we have exceeded our Buddy Poppy purchases over previous year's totals. As of June 1, 2007, Department of New York purchases have reached 532,500, which exceeded 2006 year by 16,500. Last year's total was 516,000. Almost every District exceeded their previous year's total; we still missed quota of 650,000.

While numbers indicate a positive trend, much work remains. Six years ago, the Buddy Poppy for Department of New

York was one million, today the goal has been reduced to 650,000; and yet with all the accomplishments achieved this year, that goal eludes the Department of New York. Buddy Poppies must be ordered through Department of New York and a minimum of 500 is required to be purchased to qualify for a possible white hat at Convention time.

This year's totals are rapidly reaching its conclusion, and we are grateful to all Posts who participated. Next year, let us strive to reach our goal of 650,000. Buddy Poppy Report for 88th Department New York Convention has reached its conclusion.

Two thousand and seven has been an outstanding year for Life Membership in New York. You have transmitted nearly 3,000 Life members for the year. That is a record that will long stand. I congratulate all of the Posts that participated. Yes, you can say it was because of the price increase; but I believe that there is more; that you have found how much Life Membership means to the Post and to the individual. The fact that Life members are still being transmitted means that Life Membership is still a good deal in spite of the increase.

When I became a Post Commander in 1979, we had 17 Life members. We got our Life Charter that year, and today we have 319 Life members. We will never be a 100% Life Post, but we have proven that "The more you get, the less you have to get." With help from the bell-jar funds, we pay one-half of a Life Membership. It does work!

Now, for another approach to Life Membership! The National Life Membership installment plan allows any VFW member/applicant to purchase a Life Membership by making either 11 or 23 monthly installments after an initial payment of \$35. The member will be issued a "Provisional Life" membership card. He can elect, upon receipt of the first monthly invoice, to pay via check, credit card or ACH Debit. The monthly fee includes a \$1.75 monthly service fee. The applicable Life Membership fee is to be determined using the applicant's age on December 31 of the installment plan year in which the application is submitted, regardless of actual

date of birth. A "payoff amount" will be printed on each monthly invoice, allowing the member the option to pay in full, thereby avoiding additional service fees. For any questions, see your Post Quartermaster or feel free to contact myself by phone or e-mail. Good luck and let's all have a great membership year for Commander Bob.

Only after the above steps have been taken should a Post problem be forwarded to Department. These need to be in writing and signed. By signed, they need to be signed by individuals and not "concerned members" or something of that sort. If one feels the problem is that serious then they should have no problem putting their name to it.

Calls to the State Commander's home or any other officer are unacceptable, as are calls Art Koch III to the State Office. Follow the **Department Adjutant**

chain of command listed above, and any letters forwarded should show that all steps were followed and the outcome at all levels.

Most of these types of problems can and should be resolved at the Post level. Post canteen problems are just that, Post problems, and need to be addressed at the Post level. All Posts that have canteens should have rules set in place for discipline, and these need to be followed.

3) Fundraising and Utilization of the Department Emergency Relief Fund, formerly known as the Disaster Relief Fund. This year the fund has been expanded to include emergencies beyond disasters and thus the name change. Applications are being developed and will be available through me and the Department. I am asking Surgeons at all levels of the Department to initiate a donation and/or fundraiser to bolster our Emergency Relief Fund. This is one of the most crucial funds, which impacts veterans in their time of need. Please make this a priority and send donations to the Department of New York.

A few of the items I'd like to "touch on" are: Membership

Two words are important here – **recruiting** and **retention**.

Aside from retaining our existing membership, we need to concentrate on recruiting two other major areas: Women Veterans and Returning Soldiers/Warriors.

Up until now, most veterans' organizations have basically ignored recruiting our women veterans. In my year, I plan to change this.

This virtually untapped pool of veterans equates to approximately 155,000 women in NYS alone.

I have appointed four women as membership chairpersons/recruiters that will reach out to as many of these women veterans as they can to invite them to join the VFW and ask them what this organization can do for them.

We intend to research and address health issues that are specific to these women veterans that have not been recognized before.

We also need to focus on recruiting the returning soldier/warrior. They need a Welcome Home! We, Vietnam veterans, remember all too well how we were NOT recognized and welcomed home - Most of us will never forget it!

It is important that we recognize that this generation of returning veterans have different issues to deal with upon their return than we had when we returned. We need to find ways to appeal to this group and think of new ways to attract them. Ask yourselves how you can recognize their situations and help them. Why not start a new concept in

our Post by: · Hosting a reception to recog-

- nize and welcome the returning warriors and their families in your Post, County Council, District and community.
- See that they "get connected" to a Points Contact/Case Manager with the VA to help them through their transition home.
- Encourage them to visit your Post and bring their families. Have games, toys, books, computers, etc. available for their children to enjoy.
- Ask how you can assist them on a personal basis to get them on their feet.

So, let's start to bring our organization into the 21st century! Think about how to restructure your Post to be a "Family Friendly" Post. And don't be afraid to "think outside the box!" Let them know that you are there to help them!

Officers Training School

The old OTI school, as we know it, will not happen due to its prohibitive costs over the past few years.

We are now going to bring the training down more to the local level on an ongoing basis to allow more participation and training. You will see workshops coming to your County Councils and Districts and also at Conferences and Conventions.

This new concept may take a year to "work the bugs out"

of it; but next year, it will work well.

***Let me reassure you that OTI school has not gone away -It will just be structured a little differently!

"We decided that this would be the perfect way to show our skills for a good cause as well," said Girgenti.


"Well, I figured everyone might not support the war, but they have to support our soldiers no matter what," Hall added.


Hall and Girgenti, although seniors, plan to approach members of next year's senior class with Operation Uplink.

Tribute to fallen heroes Local Iraq vet speaks about sacrifice, memory

PLATTSBURGH – Freedom comes with a high price.

Nothing comes without cost, and sacrifices are meaningless without remembrance, Donald Buhr, commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 125 on Boynton Avenue in the City of Plattsburgh, said during Monday's Memorial Day service.

"I ask you to join me in celebrating the lives of those who make the ultimate sacrifice for this nation," he said to the crowd gathered for the service. "Each life contributed to the notion of America as we know it today. God bless all of our departed heroes and their families. God bless America."

Buhr, a retired Air Force veteran, sat at the head table inside the VFW. To his right, a table for one had been set to remember those who couldn't be there Monday.

The white tablecloth adorning

that empty table was symbolic of the purity of the intentions of those who respond to the nation's call to arms. A single red rose stood for the bloodshed, a lemon a reminder of their bitter fate and the salt sprinkled on the plate represented the countless tears shed.

"May God continue to give us victory."

Veterans from conflicts such as the Korean War, World War II, Vietnam and Iraq stood proudly as the crowd joined in singing the National Anthem. A group of teenagers at one table had tears in their eyes as they sang, too.

Afterward, wreaths were placed on empty seats in front of the head table to honor fallen heroes.

Monday's guest speaker, Capt. Anne-Marie Farrell, enlisted in the United States Army in 1994 as a Patriot Missile Crew member. In 1997 she joined the National Guard and served in Bosnia and then Iraq in 2005. She has also worked as a military helicopter pilot and public affairs officer.

She lives in Plattsburgh with her husband, Michael, and is a real estate agent.

Farrell wrote columns for the *Press-Republican* while serving in Iraq and was welcomed home by a party thrown by family, neighbors and friends in November.

Farrell scanned the crowd Monday as she spoke of soldiers who defended America, liberated the oppressed and stood for freedom and democracy.

There is no greater sacrifice, she said, than laying down one's life for a friend.

"They are our nation's heroes, fathers and grandfathers, sons and daughters, our loved ones."

Their sacrifice shall never be forgotten, Farrell said, nor should anyone forget that freedom is not free.

Farrell recognized veterans present for their honorable service, saying, "You were there when the enemy bombed your base and young lives ended abruptly. You were there to reach

into your dead buddy's pocket for that goodbye letter to a mother, father, wife and children."

Farrell recalled being at her desk in Iraq and the phone conversations she had with a young female member of the military police.

One day, Farrell called to request two seats on a convoy to

northern Iraq, but she never heard back from the MP who had become her friend. The 23-yearold had been killed that morning. "She is the reason you and I can

sit in peace this day," Farrell said. "She made the ultimate sacrifice. "May God continue to give us

victory, and may He continue to bless America the beautiful.

Political Action Committee

Origin

The VFW-PAC was approved by the delegates to the 1979 National Convention and established as a separate corporation, chartered in Washington, D.C., to enhance the VFW position in its dealings with Congress.

Purpose

To support candidates for election to federal office who have taken responsible positions on legislation pertaining to our nation's veterans and issues involving national defense. VFW-PAC does not engage in state and local elections.

Composition

The VFW-PAC is governed by an eleven member Board of Directors that is comprised of a Director and Treasurer appointed by the VFW Commander-in-Chief for a one-year term; eight members - two of whom are appointed each year by the VFW Commander-in-Chief for a fouryear term; and one VFW Ladies Auxiliary member appointed by the VFW Ladies Auxiliary National President for a one-year term. The VFW Commander-in-Chief appoints one Board member to serve as Chairman for a one-year term.

Staff

The operating staff consists of a non-salaried Director, a salaried Secretary, and a parttime non-salaried Treasurer. In addition, part-time help is sometime employed to cope with excessive workload.

Funding Resources Ende

The VFW-PAC cannot accept contributions from non-members, the VFW national organization, or any other corporations that are not the results of a legitimate VFW-PAC fundraising activity. Donations can only be solicited and accepted from VFW and Ladies Auxiliary members and employees. VFW Departments, Districts, Counties, Posts and auxiliaries may contribute to VFW-PAC through fundraising events. These donations fund all VFW-PAC operating costs, political advocacy programs and candidate endorsement contributions.

Operational Responsibility

The VFW-PAC is guided by committee bylaws established by the Board of Directors and approved by the VFW National Council of Administration. The VFW-PAC regularly reports to the VFW National Council of Administration on its financial condition.

All VFW-PAC operations are regulated by the Federal Elections Commission (FEC), which includes providing the FEC with scheduled reports on all VFW-PAC activities.

The VFW-PAC is audited annually by Certified Public Accountants.

VFW Iron Triangle

The VFW-PAC, National Legislative Service and Action Corps comprise the VFW Iron Triangle, which meets frequently to discuss all legislation and initiatives in both chambers of Congress that affect veterans' entitlements and national defense.

VFW-PAC Since 1979

Endorsement Process

The VFW-PAC Board of Directors determines the endorsement policy for each Congressional election cycle. Members of Congress and nonincumbents must meet the criteria. The entire U.S. House of Representatives and one-third of the United States Senate are elected every two years. Senators are elected for six-year terms. Political party affiliations are never considered and Presidential candidates are not considered or endorsed by the VFW-PAC.

The VFW-PAC endorsement considerations will be coordinated with the respective Department and their recommendations will be considered. The VFW-PAC Board of Directors will take action, finalize all endorsements and determine the level of a monetary contribution to be presented to an endorsed candidate.

A copy of the current endorsement policy may be requested from the VFW-PAC office.

Political Advocacy

The VFW-PAC communicates regularly with members of Congress and their staffs through letters, faxes, e-mails, telephone and personal visits. New programs and initiatives are constantly being developed that directly enhance our ability to make a positive difference in the lives of veterans and military personnel, as well as strengthen our nation's security and defense posture.

Publicity

The VFW-PAC relies upon the VFW and Ladies Auxiliary National Officers, members of the National Council of Administration, VFW-PAC Board of Directors, and State PAC Chairmen to promote VFW-PAC activities.

Akron VFW Post raises \$40,960 for Alden Marine wounded in Iraq

Outpouring stuns veteran, wife

Marine Lance Cpl. Mark Beyers of Alden was handed a check for \$40,960 Thursday evening from fellow veterans at Akron Post 3180, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

"I'm still trying to take it in," he said as the three-hour party was breaking up. "I love the military family, I love the VFW, I love the community."

Beyers, 27, who lost his right arm and leg to a roadside bomb in Iraq a year ago, was attacked and robbed of \$300 with his wife, Denise, on July 22 as he was taking a break from rehabilitation in Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C.

Beyers began work last week

as an estimator with his family's business, Beyers Construction of Alden. He and his wife, who is an X-ray technical at Mercy Hospital, will use the money toward buying or building a handicapped-accessible home. "We're going to look around right away," Beyers said. "We're not going to waste an opportunity like that. We want to try to get our life started again."

Nancy O'Hara, president of the Post's women's auxiliary, said the fund drive for Beyers began last February and culminated with a silent auction on Aug. 12. "The money is still coming in," she said. "I called the bank today and learned that another \$400 has come in. We'll keep the account open for a while longer."

Most of the veterans at the party weren't acquainted with

Beyers before this all happened, but they donated just the same.

"No matter what branch you served in " said Bill Ward, a Marine veteran of World War II and the Korean War, "if you've been there, you're part of the brotherhood."


